Christopher Herbert is Managing Director of the Joint Center. Dr. Herbert has extensive experience conducting research related to housing policy and urban development, both in the U.S. and abroad. A key focus of his research has been on the financial and demographic dimensions of homeownership, and the implications for homeownership policy of the recession, housing bust, and foreclosure crisis. Having previously worked at the Joint Center in the 1990s, Herbert rejoined the Center in 2010 from Abt Associates, to serve as the Director of Research. In this role, Dr. Herbert led the team responsible for producing the Center's annual State of the Nation's Housing and its biannual America's Rental Housing reports, essential resources for both public and private decision makers in the housing industry.

Dr. Herbert was named managing director of the Joint Center in 2015, and oversees the Center's diverse sponsored research programs, its local and national conferences and symposia, as well as its student fellowship programs, designed to help train and inspire the next generation of housing leaders. He is also a Lecturer at the Harvard Graduate School of Design in the Department of Urban Planning and Design.

Dr. Herbert is co-editor of Homeownership Built to Last: Balancing Access, Affordability, and Risk After the Housing Crisis (Brookings Institution Press, 2014), and a member of the Board of Directors of the Homeownership Preservation Foundation, the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston Community Development Research Advisory Council, and the Center for Responsible Lending Research Advisory Council. He holds a PhD and Masters in Public Policy from Harvard University, and a BA in History from Dartmouth College.

David Bowers is vice president and Mid-Atlantic market leader for Enterprise Community Partners, Inc. His work includes facilitating affordable housing and community development transactions and policy implementation in collaboration with public and private sector stakeholders in the Baltimore and Washington, D.C. metropolitan areas. His office provides access to financing, capacity building and technical assistance to local developers. Enterprise's Mid-Atlantic office also participates with local coalitions advocating for increased resources for affordable housing and community development.

Since David joined Enterprise in 2004, the organization has invested more than \$750 million in capital to support affordable housing efforts in the Mid-Atlantic region, preserving or producing more than 10,000 homes. During David's tenure, the office has been a co-initiator and co-convener of the Greater Washington Housing Leaders Group, initiated several efforts including its Faith-Based Development Initiative, a transit-oriented preservation/resident displacement prevention initiative (GreenPATH) and the D.C. Green Communities Initiative. He currently serves on the board of the Washington Regional Association of Grantmakers, the Northern Virginia Affordable Housing Alliance and The National Low Income Housing Coalition.

David earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Virginia and his Master of Divinity degree from Howard University. He is an ordained minister and the founder of the all-volunteer NO MURDERS DC movement, launched in 2000. From 2013-2015 David served as the mayoral appointee as chairman of the District of Columbia Housing Production Trust Fund Advisory Board. David is a founding member of the Greater Washington chapter of 100 Black Men and a member of Leadership Greater Washington ('09). David formerly served on the boards of Thrive DC, City First Enterprises, City First Homes and Jubilee Housing.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Dear HAND Members & Friends,

Our story started 25 years ago when HAND's founder John Spencer brought together a small, dedicated group of nonprofit developers to learn and share best practices on how to better serve the housing needs of those with low-incomes. It's a simple story, really, but one that provided this organization with such a strong foundation that we are here today — celebrating this landmark anniversary of 25 years.

We often hear about HAND's origins, but what isn't always conveyed is in 1991 – that small group had no idea that their brown paper bag lunch series would evolve into an association that has more than 300 members and touches nearly 3,000 regional affordable housing and community development practitioners, annually. They also couldn't possibly have envisioned that their cohorts sitting around that table would eventually grow to include for profit developers, government agencies, financial institutions, service providers, law and accounting firms, students and so many others. John and the original starting group didn't stand on ceremony (they had to bring their own lunches!) or have grand plans of creating the regional organization that we are today. They just wanted to understand how to navigate the complex landscape of affordable housing development and interact with others who had the same goal. It's amazing how a quarter of century later, our mission has never wavered from that original course. To this day, with our training and capacity building series, matching grants — even through *News & Notes*, the Helping HAND blog and "Matters@HAND" — we are still sharing information and best practices with others who have our vision for a well-housed, thriving region.

And this is not by accident. Over the past twenty-five years, HAND has stayed relevant to our membership by being nimble in our ability to provide timely, comprehensive offerings. We have stood side-by- side with members as they helped define new affordable housing policies, as they have fought for housing trust funds and tackled the intricacies and rewards of programs such as HOME, LIHTC, NMTC, RAD and the list goes on! We are only able to do this because you, our members, take the collective belief that "We Are HAND" to heart. Our theme this year underscores the pledge each of us made when we joined this organization and reaffirms our commitment when we contribute our voices and expertise to help execute the mission. When reflecting on the past, it's only natural that we also look to the future, and imagine all the possibilities that are on the horizon. It is my hope that over the next 25 years, our region will no longer be facing a housing crisis, that our members and partners will be working on innovations in housing affordability and community development that will stretch beyond our highest hopes. What I know for sure is that HAND will be right there to help ensure our practitioners of tomorrow have all the necessary tools needed to succeed.







The Greater Washington Housing Leaders Group is a collaboration of leaders from the philanthropic, business, government, policy, advocacy, research, and financial sectors, working to elevate the visibility of the region's housing affordability challenge: 250,000 current and 150,000 potentially new severely cost burdened households.

Since 2014, the Leadership Group's efforts have focused on demonstrating the need, and its negative impacts on our region's quality of life and economic competitiveness. We will broaden support for bold, strategic solutions that reduce costs, increase availability of capital, update and innovate land use plans, and expand the region's political will to meet this challenge.

HAND'S PARTNERSHIP WITH NATIONAL HOUSING TRUST

HAND worked closely with the National Housing Trust (NHT) to ensure that the merger of Exelon Corporation and Pepco included substantial benefits for affordable housing owners and residents. As a result, the D.C. Public Service Commission (PSC) required Exelon to invest \$11.25 million in energy efficiency improvements in affordable multifamily housing. This is an unprecedented utility funding set aside for affordable housing, given the relatively small size of the D.C. ratepayer customer base. HAND and NHT filed joint testimony in the case and HAND members submitted letters to the PSC that were critical in helping to make the case that affordable housing renters and owners should share in any financial benefits that result from the merger.

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
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SHEILA CROWLEY



Sheila Crowley
Former President & CEO
National Low Income
Housing Coalition

A fter more than 17 years as the president and CEO of the National Low Income Housing Coalition, Dr. Sheila Crowley retired from the Coalition in April 2016. Throughout her tenure at NLIHC, Sheila has tirelessly led NLIHC's efforts to achieve socially just public policy that assures people with the lowest incomes in the United States have affordable and decent homes.

Dr. Crowley shaped NLIHC into the preeminent voice for housing for the lowest income people in America. Using research, organizing, communications, and media outreach, Sheila has developed partners and champions on both sides of the aisle in Congress and multiple Administrations and with thousands of low income housing advocates across the country. Sheila grew NLIHC from an operation of five staff to an organization of sixteen full time professionals.

One of Sheila's signature achievements was her nationwide effort to establish and secure funding for the National Housing Trust Fund (NHTF). Due to begin providing grants to states later this year, the NHTF is the first new federal funding in a generation targeted to expand the supply of rental housing affordable for extremely low income households.

NLIHC is now at the forefront in helping states prepare to utilize the new NHTF dollars and advocating for new non-appropriated resources for the Fund. Sheila also initiated the United for Homes campaign that seeks to modify the mortgage interest deduction and use the revenue saved to fund affordable housing for the lowest income people in America to end homelessness.

During her leadership, NLIHC's state coalition partner project grew into a strong network of partners working together to end homelessness and housing poverty throughout the country. Currently, NLIHC has 66 state partners in 42 states and the District of Columbia.

A PhD in Social Work and Social Policy, Dr. Crowley was named in 1996-97 the Social Work Congressional Fellow to the Housing Subcommittee of the U.S. Senate Banking Committee. Sheila came to Washington after two decades of work in Richmond, VA, where she served as executive director of The Daily Planet, a multipurpose homeless service and advocacy organization. She was the founding director in 1979 of the YWCA Women's Advocacy Program in Richmond, the shelter and service program for battered women and their children.



n 2015, leading Mid-Atlantic affordable housing developer CPDC embarked on new territory both geographically and in terms of the depth and scope of its work with residents and the community.

Robust Growth in New Markets

Leveraging innovative financing and critical partnerships, CPDC expanded its footprint into new markets, including Baltimore, MD and the Richmond and Hampton Roads areas of Virginia. In 2015, CPDC progressed on four new projects in these new markets alone—acquiring their first property in Newport News, VA: 274 units at Auburn Pointe; closing on their first property in Baltimore, MD: 130 units at Hollins House; breaking ground on their first Richmond, VA community: 77 new senior apartments at Highland Park Senior

Apartments; and refinancing Woodmere Trace, 300 units in Norfolk, VA.

Innovative Partnerships for Community Development In addition to having nearly 1,100 units acquired, renovated or under construction, in 2015 CPDC made equally important strides in

redefining and broadening its resident services model.

The new Community Impact Strategies (CIS) program seeks to have greater impact on entire neighborhoods through community development and relies on alliances with residents, private sector institutions, non-profits and local and federal government agencies to provide services and resources benefitting residents and

those in the immediately surrounding communities.

CPDC's strategic partnerships in the new markets of Richmond, VA and Baltimore, MD are already flourishing. In Richmond, CPDC is working with Virginia Commonwealth University and in Baltimore with the University of Maryland and Johns Hopkins on neighborhood revitalization and to connect residents to critically-needed health and wellness services.

Empowering Residents through Reinvestment A shining example of CPDC's impact beyond real estate development is the recent transformation of the Southeast D.C. Arbor View property. Following a \$12 million reinvestment, Arbor View is thriving as a mixed-income, mixed-use community with a rich network of services accessible to residents and the entire Ward 8 D.C. neighborhood.

> Through expansion into new markets, thoughtful community development and the cultivation of mixed-income communities, CPDC has made great strides toward their 2014-2018 Strategic Plan while laying the foundation for continued impact in affordable housing and community development.

METROTOWNS AT PARKSIDE



The genesis behind MetroTowns at Parkside: The Linda Joy and Kenneth Jay Pollin Memorial Community came from legendary District of Columbia civic leader, Abe Pollin, who saw a tremendous need for affordable homeownership opportunities for people who work to serve the District.

In partnership with the City and the DC Housing Authority, an obsolete public housing rental development, Parkside Additions, and an adjacent vacant parcel were selected for the site. Mr. Pollin invited Enterprise Homes to join the team and a joint venture was formed. The MetroTowns redevelopment and financing plans were approved thanks to multiple constituencies working together to execute Mr. Pollin's vision.

Completed in 2015, MetroTowns includes 125 homes centered around a new neighborhood park in northeast Washington, DC. There are 83 homeownership units serving households earning between 30% and 100% AMI (with the majority at 60% - 75% AMI) and 42 affordable rental units representing a one-for-one replacement of the 42 former Parkside Additions units that were demolished. The for-sale homes are three-bedroom/three-bath townhomes; the rentals include one- and two-bedroom apartments and three-bedroom townhomes identical to the for-sale homes. A number of homes were built to accommodate the physically and audio/visually impaired.

Located a short walk from the Minnesota Avenue Metro stop, the community provides affordable homeownership opportunities for the DC workforce that were previously unavailable in the market. The development team employed a creative marketing strategy, establishing a 6-month period during which homes were available for purchase only to DC government employees.

Additionally, all former Parkside Additions residents were offered intensive community supportive services including case management, job training and homeownership training for those interested in purchasing. Thirty-one households participated; while most former Parkside Additions residents selected rental units, three are now proud homeowners. Homeownership opportunities were also offered to households on the DC Housing Authority's waiting list, six of whom bought MetroTowns homes.

Nationally-recognized urban planners designed the \$34 million community drawing on the architectural traditions of storied DC neighborhoods such as Georgetown, Logan Circle and Dupont Circle. All homes within each row were designed with a different look, using varied materials and colors to create the sense of an older neighborhood built over time. Thanks to Abe Pollin and his team, MetroTowns has replaced an obsolete former public housing project with a vibrant new mixed-income community convenient to schools and transit that serves the DC workforce, and has helped transform the Parkside neighborhood.

TRINITY PLAZA



Trinity Plaza is the culmination of a vision of Pastors Eugene Sheppard and Patrice Sheppard to serve low-income at-risk families by bringing affordable housing and community-serving retail to the corner of South Capitol and Atlantic Streets SW.

The Pastors' work in the far southwest and southeast neighborhoods known as Bellevue, Congress Heights, Anacostia and Washington Highlands began in 1989 at a transitional shelter for homeless families. Recognizing the cycle of poverty that plagued poor families, they incorporated the nonprofit Lydia's House in 1990 to provide tangible and timely social services to restore human dignity. In 1991, the Sheppard's responded to the need of local residents for a spiritual relationship on

which to build their lives in order to end the cycle of poverty by establishing Living Word Church. In 1998, continued to be challenged by the lack of community and economic development opportunities, they created the Far SW-SE Community Development Corporation (CDC).

The CDC purchased and assembled 3 parcels of land at the corner of South Capitol and Atlantic Streets SW beginning in 2001, where Trinity Plaza now stands. The new construction four-story building includes forty-seven apartments with one, two and three bedroom floorplans over ground floor retail space and parking. Residents enjoy a community room, fitness center, an outdoor terrace, and secure building and parking access. The ground floor retail has been leased to an independent and local childcare center for infants and toddlers.

Trinity Plaza was financed using tax exempt bonds issued by the DC Housing Finance Agency and equity generated from the sale of 4% low income housing tax credits. Bank of America purchased the bonds under a private placement structure, Raymond James was the syndicator, and Capital One Bank was the end investor. The DC Department of Housing and Community Development was a key partner, providing predevelopment and permanent gap financing for the project. A number of competitive grants were secured by the CDC from Enterprise Community Partners and the Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development which further supported the project. The CDC selected Mission First as its development partner, Hamel Builders as the general contractor, and Grimm + Parker as the architect.

The CDC worked closely during the predevelopment process with Enterprise's Faith Based Development Initiative (FBDI), and now serves as a mentor to other faith-based nonprofits seeking to complete mission-based developments through FBDI.

ARLINGTON COUNTY



A rlington County's affordable housing legacy began as the first modern wave of federal employees searched for a home close to their work in downtown DC or the Pentagon during World War II. This legacy evolved over the last half century as Arlington planned for and opened the Orange and Blue Metro rail lines, precipitating more multi-family housing and bringing tens of thousands of additional jobs.

Most recently, the Arlington County Board adopted the County's first Affordable Housing Master Plan (AHMP) in 2015 as an element of the County's Comprehensive Plan. The plan, a culmination of a three-year community effort, prepares Arlington for the next generation of sustainable, affordable housing that supports its residents, improves neighborhoods and strengthens the economy.

Over the years, Arlington adopted a series of housing policies and developed financing and planning tools to support its holistic housing and homeless programs. These efforts resulted in the production and preservation of over 7,500 affordable units (income restricted) and achieving "functional zero" in veteran's homelessness. In 2012, the County Board recognized that market forces continued to raise the cost of housing and threatened a continued loss of affordable units. Therefore, it initiated the Affordable Housing Study to evaluate existing policies; assess current programs and resources; and identify needs and gaps in provisions for affordable housing.

The plan, and its companion Implementation Framework, is organized around three goals:

Increase supply: Preserve or produce about 15,800 rental units affordable to households with incomes below \$65,000 (Household incomes referenced are for a four-person household. Actual income thresholds are determined by a percentage of area median income adjusted by household size.), and produce about 2,700 ownership units for households with incomes up to \$130,000, all by 2040. Ensure access: Increase access to market rate and affordable units for low- and moderate-wage working households, as well as households with a wide range of special needs. This goal can be accomplished by:

- Enforcing and advancing fair housing policies,
- Maintaining rental assistant programs for households earning less than \$43,000
- Providing assistance to first-time homebuyers for households with incomes less than \$87,000.

Contribute to a sustainable community: Housing affordability contributes to Arlington's sustainability when it ensures safe and decent housing, coordinates its policies and programs with on-going land use and transportation planning efforts and integrates environmental best practices into its funding recommendations.

Staff are now working with the community to implement the Plan. The County is fortunate to have an active and caring community that advocates for housing and homeless programs, elected officials that have consistently invested in these programs and staff and partnering agencies that can effectively implement them. The development team employed a creative marketing strategy, establishing a 6-month period during which homes were available for purchase only to DC government employees.

JOCELYN HARRIS



Jocelyn Harris started as an intern at Housing Initiative Partnership, Inc. (HIP) in July 2007 while earning her Masters in Community Planning from University of Maryland at College Park. Immediately upon graduation, Jocelyn joined the staff as the sole Housing Developer managing the HIP Homes program in which HIP acquires vacant and distressed homes in targeted neighborhoods of Prince George's County, renovates them to a high standard of energy efficiency and design, and sells them to low-income first-time home buyers.

Through Jocelyn's leadership, HIP Homes increased its production dramatically, completing 24 homes with another

eight under development since 2008 with 17 acquired in just the last two years. Jocelyn juggles a wide range of funding sources to maximize development. She must recycle program income earned from HOME and NSP while meeting funding deadlines for new sources. Jocelyn works with an architect to develop renovation plans and then bids out the work and oversees renovations. Quality

finishes transform the homes from worst to best on the block, while gut renovations ensure code compliant and energy efficient systems. In FY 2016, Jocelyn sold seven homes and managed almost \$2 million in development costs. She currently has nine houses under development, including completion of Prince George's County's first "passive house," a prototype energy-efficient home for a low-income family.

In 2014, Jocelyn assumed management of the Homeowner Rehabilitation Assistance Program (HRAP) in partnership with Prince George's County. This \$2.5 million program provided deferred loans to 43 low-income homeowners, mostly seniors, who otherwise lack the resources to repair their homes. Jocelyn marketed the program, managed an extensive wait list, helped pre-qualify the homeowners, engaged construction consultants to develop plans and specifications, bid out the work and managed the general contractors. She has juggled up to 15 loans in process at any one time. Jocelyn is known for her exceptional work ethic and organizational skills and her engaging personality, infinite patience, negotiating skills and maturity in dealing with anxious clients, general contractors, and public officials to solve a myriad of issues.

Jocelyn was recognized in 2014 as a "Forty under 40" cohort by the Prince George's County Social Innovation Fund, and in 2013 as a fellow in the Urban Land Institute Leadership Institute and as a member of the Associated Black Charities Leadership Development Cohort. She served as a panelist at the 2012 Governor's Conference on Housing. She is part of HIP's leadership team. mission-based developments through FBDI.





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
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
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
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
